Alaka'i Today, we come face to face with the scandal of Advent: Mary, the unmarried mother; God Incarnate growing in Mary's womb as a vulnerable baby; Joseph contemplating leaving Mary because of her pregnancy; God's love at work in ways that society and propriety could not understand; God calling Mary and Joseph to faithfulness despite the fear of disgrace.

Anaina **With Mary and Joseph, we choose to wait, watch, and listen for the way of Love instead of responding in fear to the world's judgment.**

Alaka'i We light this candle of love as a sign of our faithfulness as we seek, find, and follow Emmanuel, God with us.

THE HOLY GOSPEL

ACCORDING TO SAINT MATTHEW 1:18-25

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be pregnant from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to divorce her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, “Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins.” All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: “Look, the virgin shall become pregnant and give birth to a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel,” which means, “God is with us.” When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.

CONFESS& RECONCILIATION

THE WORDS OF INSTITUTION

NA 'OLELO HO'OKUMU

Kabu Kiwaha Holy One, in Jesus Christ you have reconciled all things—those on earth and those in heaven—binding the broken pieces of creation together in a harmony we can scarcely imagine. We remember with gratitude the life he lived among us: healing the sick, lifting the lowly, breaking down barriers of oppression, and proclaiming a reign rooted in mercy, justice, and transformative love. We remember how he welcomed the forgotten,

confronted the powers that scattered your people, and revealed your fullness in every act of compassion. And we remember that, in the face of betrayal and violence, he chose forgiveness over retaliation and love over fear.

On the night he was betrayed, Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it saying: “This is my body, given for you.”

After supper he took the cup, saying: “This cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this in remembrance of me.” As we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim not only his death and resurrection, but the reconciling peace he pours into the world—a peace by which all things hold together.

And so, we proclaim the mystery of our faith:

Kākou **Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.**

Who We Are

A PEOPLE OF EXTRAVAGANT WELCOME

This is God's house of prayer, refuge, and belonging for all people. We believe that no matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here. We acknowledge that there are too many exclusive spaces in this world – including some churches. We are not one of them. All are invited and all are welcome, to experience the love and presence of God and community just as they are.

THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST

Our heritage is rooted in the faith of Henry 'Ōpūkaha'ia who inspired the Congregationalist missionaries to bring Christianity to Hawaii in 1820. Today, we are the **United Church of Christ**. Our mission is to follow Jesus by loving God and neighbor, working for justice, and building a peaceful, inclusive world. Our theology centers on God's love and grace, revealed through Jesus Christ. The UCC values both the Bible and human reason, encouraging people to explore faith with openness and honesty. We believe in a Still Speaking God, meaning God continues to guide us today through the Holy Spirit, community, and conscience.

A PEOPLE WITH A MISSION

Sent forth by the Spirit, we follow Jesus into the world – loving God and neighbor through our **service**, our **witness**, and our **faithful stewardship of creation**.

A PEOPLE WITH A VISION

We envision Puka'ana Congregational Church to be a house of prayer, refuge, and belonging for all people where lives are transformed by the gospel, disciples of Jesus are nurtured and equipped, all are drawn into loving, faithful relationship with God through Christ and compassionate action in the world; and, rooted in our kuleana to malama aina, our commitment to the faithful stewardship of the land, waters, and historic spaces entrusted to our care is lived out as an expression of our love for God, creation, and future generations.

A PEOPLE WHO ALOHA 'ĀINA

We are in the ahupua'a of Keālia, in the moku of Kona, on the mokupuni of Hawai'i, in the pae'āina of Papahānaumokuākea. Hawai'i is an indigenous space whose original people are Kānaka 'Ōiwi. We recognize that generations of Hawaiian ancestral knowledge and lifeways have shaped and continue to care for this 'āina so that we can enjoy the gifts of this special place. We affirm our commitment to just and faithful stewardship of this 'āina upon which we continue to live out our faith in worship, fellowship, and service. We join in the work towards authentic reconciliation and healing.

What to Expect at Worship

WORSHIP LIFE AT PUKAANA

Our worship life is expressed in our Sunday Services, in services commemorating “holy” days sacred to the story of Christianity and to the Hawaiian congregational churches, and in services celebrated together with the wider UCC family. We follow a liturgical pattern – calls to worship, invoking prayers, readings, sermons, reciting the creeds, prayers of the people, tithes and offerings, holy communion, and, of course, the singing of hymns and praise songs.

WEEKLY COMMUNION

We celebrate Communion weekly in our church. Communion serves as a tangible reminder of the redemption, reconciliation, and restoration available to us all through Jesus Christ. We are moved by Christ’s leading to break bread together and share the cup “as often” as possible – creating as many opportunities to invite and welcome all to come to the table just as they are. We invite all with extravagant welcome to join us at Christ’s table.

LANGUAGES

As a historic, Hawaiian, congregational church, our services are conducted in both English and ‘Ōlelo Hawai‘i. Our church welcomes people of all languages and dialects to share in our services in ways they are comfortable.

MUSIC STYLE

Our congregation loves to sing. We sing hymns that have been passed through the generations in English and ‘Ōlelo Hawai‘i. We also enjoy singing contemporary praise and worship songs and other appropriate secular songs.

BIBLE TRANSLATIONS

Bible translations are a matter of personal preference. Whatever translation, or version, speaks to your heart and to your life is welcome. In our Worship Aid, the readings are provided in Ka Baibala Hemolele and the New Revised Standard Version.

WHAT TO WEAR TO CHURCH

When you come to Puka‘ana you will see a mixture of clothing styles. Some are more formal, but most dress casually especially on those warm summer days. You are welcome here no matter what you wear, so wear whatever you feel comfortable in!

If this is your first time to our church, you will be greeted warmly by our folks. If you have any questions, concerns, or need help, you are welcome to ask us at any time.
